## Auckland Meeting – May 1994

The meeting was held at the Memorial Hall in Ellerslie.

The evening began with registrations for the members eagerly awaiting the start of another wonderful weekend. Among the group were members from the USA and Australia as well as the length and breadth of New Zealand. The sales tables started to fill up and proved to be a place of much interest as many bargains were on offer. The drawing of ten film raffles took place and then it was movie time. Presented by veteran Doug Harley, using that wonderful work horse of the cinema, an Ernemann 7b, we saw a selection of trailers, a film of colour graphics and images, all topped off by the antics of Tom and Jerry. Supper was served which brought the evening to a close.

Saturday morning at 8.15 am, members arrived in time to board the buses for the drive to Rainbow's End for a tour and show. *Motion Master* was awesome. Sunday began with morning tea before we headed to the Hollywood Theatre in Avondale where a wonderful film programme had been prepared by Jan Grefstad for our viewing. Then it was off to the Westwind for more movies, a demonstration of their great sound system and a sausage sizzle lunch. The theatre which seats about 60 is inviting and comfortable.
