Date 31st October, 1st 2nd November.

The meeting was held at the Christchurch Amateur Radio Rooms in Idris Road. 42 were in attendance, which included some of our regular attendees from Australia.

This meeting would celebrate 30 years of the NZ Film Buffs Association Incorporated.

Friday night began with the usual catch up with old friends, a social drink and a look at the sales table. Continuous finger food was provided throughout the evening. Member Bruce Thompson from Ohakune reminisced about his family's involvement in film exhibition since 1923. This was a fascinating history and was all captured on film by Hugh Macdonald. After a short break it was decided to do part of the auction. Among the items, were a few bottles of vintage wine, especially labelled for our anniversary. The night then came to a close.
